



101. Our defense of the innocent unborn, for example, needs to be clear, firm and passionate, for at stake is the dignity of a human life, which is always sacred and demands love for each person, regardless of his or her stage of development. Equally sacred, however, are the lives of the poor, those already born, the destitute, the abandoned and the underprivileged, the vulnerable infirm and elderly exposed to covert euthanasia, the victims of human trafficking, new forms of slavery, and every form of rejection. We cannot uphold an ideal of holiness that would ignore injustice in a world where some revel, spend with abandon and live only for the latest consumer goods, even as others look on from afar, living their entire lives in abject poverty.

102. We often hear it said that the situation of migrants is a lesser issue. Some Catholics consider it a secondary issue compared to the "grave" bioethical questions. That a politician looking for votes might say such a thing is understandable, but not a Christian, for whom the only proper attitude is to stand in the shoes of those brothers and sisters of ours who risk their lives to offer a future to their children.





Candidate Positions


- Funding housing, nutrition programs and other economic supports

Candidate Positions

- Seeks to accurately measure and address economic inequality, including racial wealth and income gap
- Supports family in immigration policies and humane treatment of immigrants, protects Dreamers
- Supports policies that address climate change



Multi-Issue Voter Messaging

- It is immoral to allow a single issue to outweigh candidates' positions that harm immigrants and asylum seekers, low-income families, people of color, the LGBTQ+ community, the environment, and other marginalized communities
- Focus on a single issue allows other social sins to continue unchecked environmental destruction, economic exploitation, harm to immigrants, racism, and more.
- In recent years, Pope Francis echoing hundreds of years of Church teaching has spoken clearly and forcefully about the demands facing Catholics in the public sphere.
- We cannot support candidates whose policies worsen economic inequality, sow division, racism, and xenophobia, and impose greater harm on the most vulnerable
- Racism and economic inequality are systemic problems that need systemic solutions. We need policies that advance racial and economic justice. As we say: "Policies got us into this, policies can get us out."
- We encourage people of faith to listen to their own conscience and embrace an expansive, inclusive agenda of political priorities instead of a narrow one




